

Online course on European Citizenship and Identity

General Description

This online course is made up of **4 modules**, each of which is detailed below. The course is designed for **Bachelor-degree students** and represents a **20-hour course (5 hours per module)**.

The course is **available from March 10th, 2025, to June, 30th, 2025**, on the **UNITA Moodle platform** (you will receive a connection link after enrolment).

Completion of this course or some of its modules can be **added to or integrated into your curriculum**, depending on the regulations of your university. The course can come in addition to your curriculum, as a bonus, recognised by a digital badge.

The 4 modules are worth 2 ECTS, but you can also choose only 2 modules, according to your wishes, your needs and the requirements of your university.

More details on the modules

- History Module – teacher in charge: Anne-Sophie Nardelli, associate professor in History

The learning objectives of the course are to understand the historical development of the notion of European citizenship and the political issues linked to it, as well as to get awareness of the impact of this historical development on the debates that have come along the European integration. At the end of the module, the student should be able to identify some historical references often referred to in political debates and discourses.

- Economy Module – teacher in charge: Ioana Vadasan, associate professor in Economy

This module of the course European Citizenship provides a focus on European citizenship from an economic perspective. The students will see how the European Union has been constructed, through treaties, and how each treaty has contributed to what is the EU is today. The course also focuses on the freedoms of movement and on the main European policies, on the Euro area, as well as on the enlargements of the European Union.

- Sustainable Development Module – teacher in charge: Meriem Mengi, associate professor in Management Sciences

This module provides a focus on European citizenship from a sustainable development perspective. The Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) were established in 2015 by the international community as part of the United Nations 2030 Agenda. The EU made a positive contribution to the development of the 2030 Agenda, making sustainable

development the keystone of European policies so that European identity can lead transitions. At the end of the module, the student should have competencies on sustainable development goals through an understanding of major concepts and skills acquisition where the vision of the 2030 Agenda is fully consistent with the objectives of EU.

- Law Module – teacher in charge: Damien Bouvier, associate professor in Public Law

This module on EU Citizenship is meant to make you familiar with the legal basics of EU Citizenship: what are the rights of EU citizens and how they do work. The course is based both on theory and practical case studies.

Which kind of activities are you going to take?

The modules are based on a various range of activities: written parts, audio and video presentations, readings (articles or other kinds of short texts to read), short activities on these readings to exercise analytical and critical thinking.

The final assessment will be a quiz for each module.
